



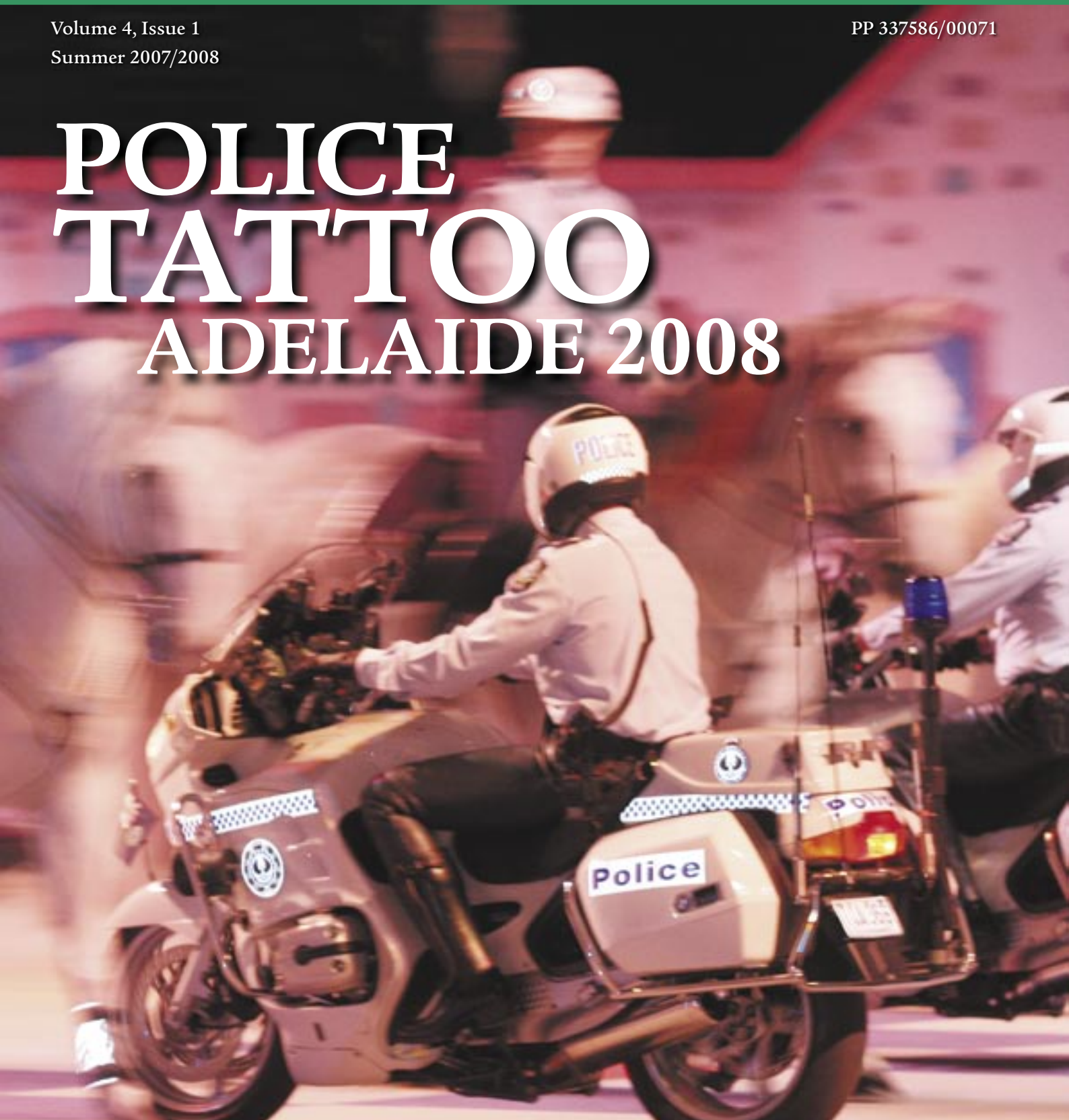

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# FROM THE STATE CO-ORDINATOR

I have recently returned from Wellington in New Zealand where I attended the Neighbourhood Watch Australasia Inc Conference and Annual General Meeting from Wednesday 10th to Saturday 13th of October 2007. Every State and Territory was represented except New South Wales (politics I believe) and the event was hosted by Neighbourhood Support, the NZ equivalent of our Neighbourhood Watch program.

On the Saturday, all delegates travelled to Levin (about an hour or so north of Wellington) where I was pleased to present to their National Rally on the current state of WatchSA in South Australia. I was interested to hear about some of the excellent initiatives and developments from my interstate and overseas colleagues but I couldn't help thinking that South Australia is, in many respects, leading the way in community based crime prevention.

Please don't think me big-headed by making this statement, but the fact is our multifaceted approach with the five primary Watch programs, our program's foundation on problem solving and our focus on achieving community safety

through a true partnership between police and volunteers are features that are not universal and envied by those States and Territories that do not enjoy them. What I also found heartening was that several other States have recently undertaken reviews of their Neighbourhood Watch programs and have recommended the adoption of many of the fundamentals we have already embraced.

Sure, we can definitely do things better and we are, after all, only 1 year into our 3-Year Action Plan.

I believe that to remain effective, any program needs to evolve - to stay in step with new approaches and technologies but also to remain relevant within the community the program serves. We have issues we are working on to improve and that's good.

If we don't change, we risk stagnating. I am seeing the benefits of our new, more flexible approaches, with new areas being launched and closed areas relaunched, and we are seeing younger people getting involved in the program. Western Australia celebrates 25 years of Neighbourhood Watch this year, Victoria does so next year. Neighbourhood Watch and all the Watch programs are long-term initiatives, we're not 'flash in the pan' despite what our critics say and our criminals hoped!

# 'ON THE TRAIL OF CRIME REDUCTION'



A new 'Crime Message and Marketing Trailer' has been launched by SAPOL's Crime Reduction Section.

The new billboard trailer, sponsored by insurance company SGIC, will be used as part of ongoing crime reduction initiatives, including site visits to shopping centres, field days, corporate and school events.

The trailer has 4 interchangeable advertising skins that promote customised crime prevention messages targeting motor vehicle theft, home security, building site theft and crime deterrence.

Sergeant Joanne Howard, of SAPOL's Crime Reduction Section, said "Crime prevention is everybody's responsibility and working in partnership with SGIC has assisted us with our crime prevention work".

"We use the trailer to display crime prevention images and messages that cleverly catch the attention both of law-abiding members of the community as well as potential offenders."

# WHERE ARE MY KEYS ?

Replacing stolen or lost keys can be expensive. Making sure your keys can be identified saves a lot of time and hassle.

In the recent *SA Motor* magazine (Nov/Dec 2007, page 33) there is an interesting article under the heading of "car key costs". The increased vehicle security has come at a cost to the owner if the keys to the car are lost. The article states:

*"If you lose your keys to a Range Rover Sport V8, by the time you buy a new computer, two keys, lock tumblers and then have them re-coded, the total bill could be over \$6,000. At the other end of the spectrum, the Mazda 2 Neo was the cheapest in the survey at \$113, and you can get a replacement within 24 hours."*

The article prompted me to look at my own key rings.



Like most Neighbourhood Watch volunteers, I am mindful to minimise the number of keys that I actually carry and keep additional keys either secured in a safe or, in the case of house keys, with a trusted relative or friend. In addition to the car key and remote, I also carry a remote house alarm and automatic door opener as well as the usual keys to actually get into the house. The total cost of replacing the keys, in both money and time, would be expensive and there

would always be that nagging doubt about the possibility of the keys being used to break into the house.

By now you have spotted the familiar green and white faces of the Neighbourhood Watch key ring. On the back of the key ring I do have "S" for South Australia and my driver's licence number so if I ever lost my keys, the finder would be prompted to hand them into any police station where I could be traced using my licence number.

Neighbourhood Watch Association sell the key rings in packs of ten for \$18.30 (see the combined order form in this magazine). With Christmas here soon, why don't you borrow the engraver from your local Neighbourhood Watch, engrave the driver's licence number of your friends and relatives and surprise them with an inexpensive gift that may save them the unexpected costs of replacing lost keys.

For another \$3.00 you could combine the key ring with a PlateSafe Screw kit for their car. The screws are the same as supplied with the vehicle except that the head of the screw and/or bolt is changed to a non reversible one so that the number plates cannot be easily removed and used in a petrol drive off or other crime.

The Neighbourhood Watch Association is a non profit organisation so any profits from sales are used to further Neighbourhood Watch.

# SAPOL HOME ASSIST SCHEME

**T**he SAPOL Home Assist Scheme is funded by Home and Community Care (HACC), a partnership between Local Councils, the Commonwealth Government, State Government, SAPOL and other participating health services. The aim of the scheme is to improve home and personal safety, allow people to remain in their own homes and to provide a better quality of life.

This scheme is only available for people who are HACC eligible. To meet the criteria you must:

- be frail elderly (usually aged over 65 years)
- be of any age and live with a disability
- care or look after someone who is frail aged or lives with a disability.

**Police Officers within the Crime Reduction Section provide:**

**Free Security Audits** - A police co-ordinator will visit

you at home. You will be provided with a written document highlighting your safety and security issues. The police officer will provide you with the contact details for the Home Assist representative within your local council. You may also receive assistance to implement police suggestions.

**Free Group Presentations** - These are available to groups of 15 people or more. The 3 presentations are:

**Home and Personal Safety** - This presentation provides home security and safety tips.

**Safety for Residents in an Aged Care Facility** - This presentation provides security and safety advice to residents in an aged care facility.

**Safety in the Client's Home** - This presentation is aimed at carers and volunteers providing Home Assist services to clients in their home.

# POORAKA NHW - 15 YEARS

Fifteen years ago after a letter from George Swandale (a local resident) Neighbourhood Watch started in Pooraka.

In the beginning we were divided into two different Areas 365 and 366 with approximately 900 homes in each area. Each group worked independently with its own committees and ideas for about five years when it was decided to combine both to make Area 365/366 under one executive committee. The current executive format has been together for about nine years holding Executive and Residents' Meetings a week apart every five weeks.

We produce 2000 newsletters for every home and business as well as distributing to all Salisbury Council members, local politicians State and Federal, as well as Police stations within the LSA.

We have an active group of 49 residents who look after the 64 zones within the suburb - of these, twenty eight have completed 15 years of service to our Neighbourhood Watch with a further eight completing 10 years and seven involved for five.

On Tuesday 18th September in the Pooraka Primary School Gym, a presentation evening was held to acknowledge these residents and plaques and certificates were given to eight local business houses who continually support our efforts.

These pictures show 24 of the 15 year residents, the celebration cake and a shot of the police officers who were in attendance - Salisbury Council mayor and councillors and Federal and State Politicians were also attendees.

We have always had a close relationship with the Salisbury Station, Neighbourhood Watch Admin and the local residents and look forward to many more years of our Watch in Pooraka.

The Gentle Bear Program is a joint initiative between SAPOL and Gallagher Bassett where soft bears are provided to comfort children who have been traumatised due to domestic violence, injury, death or other emotional situations. South Australia Police is the first Australian police service to adopt the program which is now winding out to other States and Territories.

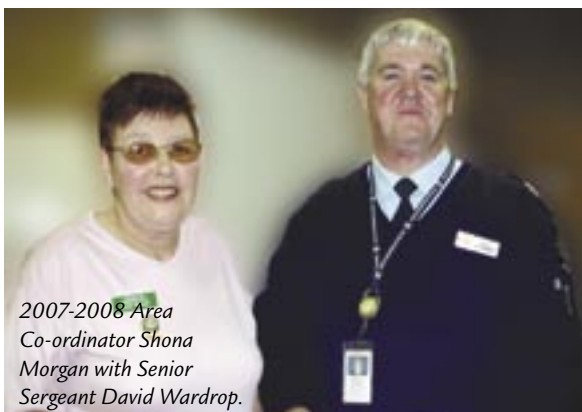

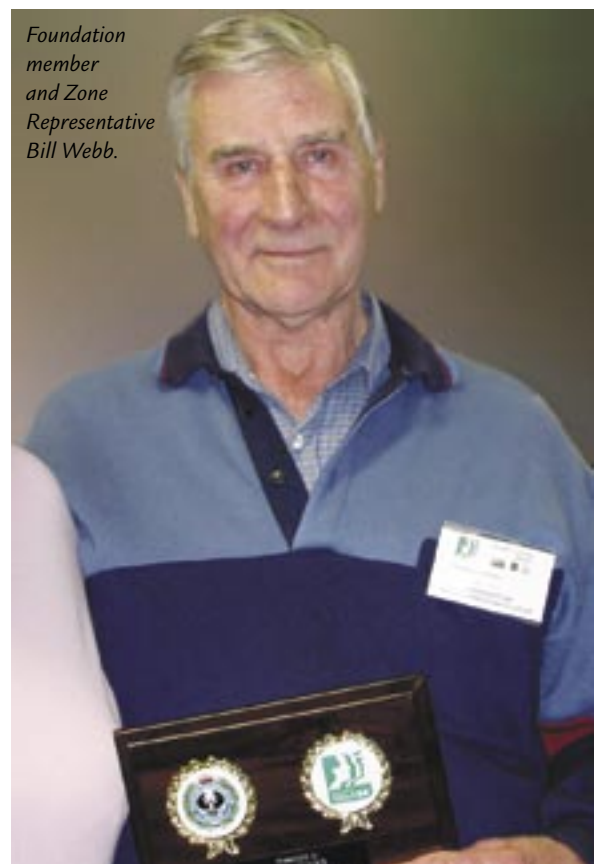

# MOTOR VEHICLE AWARENESS

## TRAFFIC WATCH

Dangerous driving can be reported to police.

If you see poor or dangerous driving such as disobeying traffic lights, speeding or hoons doing burnouts or drag racing, report it to police immediately by calling 131 444 and ask to make a Traffic Watch Complaint. You may also attend at any Police Station to make a traffic complaint.

What the police will want to know:

- Where it happened;
- Vehicle details, including registration number and description of the vehicle, if you have them;
- What exactly was the driving behaviour that you deemed to be dangerous or reckless;
- The time and date of the bad driving; and
- Your contact details.

If you wish you can remain anonymous.

## DRIVING SAFELY

- Park in a well-lit and highly visible area.
- Always have your car keys in your hand when approaching your vehicle.
- Make sure your car is serviced regularly.
- Consider joining a 24 hour roadside assistance service.
- Make sure you have enough fuel to get to your destinations and home again.
- Keep the windows up and doors locked.
- Do not leave your car unlocked or running whilst unloading shopping or opening gates.
- When driving alone do not stop to help motorists who appear to be having difficulties.
- Never pick up hitchhikers.
- Do not respond to aggressive behaviour from other drivers. Stay calm and avoid eye contact.
- If you have an accident, it is not always necessary to leave the vehicle. If in doubt, exchange particulars through a partly opened window with your doors locked.

## FATIGUED DRIVERS

- Driver fatigue may be a factor in up to 30% of fatal crashes and up to 15% of serious injury crashes. It is as much a problem for city as country drivers.

*“Three main causes of fatigue are lack of sleep, driving when you would normally be asleep or engaging in long, stressful or repetitive tasks before or during driving.”*

- Being tired while driving does not just concern anyone driving a long distance. It can affect shift-workers, parents/carers of young children who haven't had much sleep and also those with sleep problems.
- Driving after being awake for 17 hours brings a similar crash risk as that of a blood alcohol level of 0.05.
- Driving after 24 hours without sleep corresponds to a blood alcohol level of 0.10.
- Three main causes of fatigue are lack of sleep, driving when you would normally be asleep or engaging in long, stressful or repetitive tasks before or during driving.

## SEATBELTS AND CHILD RESTRAINTS

You can double your chance of surviving a car crash with one simple action.

Using a seatbelt reduces the risk of death for front seat car occupants by around 50 per cent. Yet, every year up to 33% of fatally injured Australian car occupants (about 300) and 19 per cent of the seriously injured (about 4,200) are unbelted.

Some of these are children. Because seatbelts and child restraints are so effective in saving lives and preventing injuries, laws have been enacted to make the wearing of seatbelts compulsory under most circumstances, and to make the driver responsible for the restraint of children.

## SAFETY TIPS

- Check the age of your seatbelts and replace frayed and damaged seatbelts promptly.
- The rear seat is the safest position for children.

# NEIGHBOURHOOD NEWSLETTERS: A UNIFORM APPROACH TO KEEPING COMMUNITIES INFORMED

Your area newsletter is a vital link between the Neighbourhood Watch program and your local community. Ideally it should be informing your community and promoting the work of the program and volunteers in keeping crime down in your area.

**A**s Area Co-ordinators and their newsletter editors know, it takes time, effort, resources, co-ordination and commitment to produce and deliver a consistently relevant, readable and effective publication.

Neighbourhood Newsletters, in conjunction with the NHW Association, has developed a professional, relevant and reliable service which is now available at no cost to NHW groups across the State.

Neighbourhood Newsletters is a self-funded local newsletter production company, which specialises in providing area-specific newsletters to WatchSA communities. It has been developed to add consistency and quality to the newsletter production process. It aims to ease the burden on volunteers while encouraging quality information and participation in the program from your community.

Following a pilot and development period of 12 months in Morphet Vale Areas 195 and 057 (with the support of the Community Programs Section), the Neighbourhood Newsletter service was presented to delegates of the State Council NHW Association on 30 June 2007. The service was praised at the meeting and received the endorsement of the Association Executive as a cost-effective marketing tool to raise the profile of the NHW program and the work of local groups in reducing crime through raising awareness of crime and related community issues.

Publisher and managing editor Mark Bird is a qualified journalist and former community police officer. Mark was recently an intelligence analyst with SAPOL's State Intelligence Branch where he produced assessments of crime across SA and edited a regular Intelligence Bulletin keeping operational police and analysts up-to-date with crime trends.



The Neighbourhood Newsletter service is now available to your area and Mark is happy to consult with interested Area Co-ordinators and groups.

Co-ordinators need only supply incident reports and any articles for layout (e.g. Co-ordinator's report) and in the ensuing two weeks of production Mark arranges additional articles and items in line with the WatchSA Themes Calendar to inform communities on how to deter, report and reduce crime.

Notably he produces an 'incident map' of your area and gathers support from local businesses to subsidise production and printing costs. Following a proof read by Police and Area Co-ordinators, up to 3000 four-page newsletters are printed and delivered every two months to your co-ordinator/nominee AT NO COST.

Initial results have been encouraging. In the pilot area (Morphet Vale 195), crime has been cut by nearly a half, while Hectorville 084 reported recruitment of three new members following the distribution of the initial newsletter. At the time of writing, Waikerie 319 has become the first regional location to adopt the service.
